









While there has been considerable public support, challenges are an unavoidable aspect of any transformative journey, making the emotional process of becoming a university both rewarding and difficult. Although many community members and alumni were supportive, there were surprising voices of dissent. Dr. Pollard stated, "Navigating these challenges helped strengthen the institution and its leadership, fostering a deeper understanding of the community's needs and expectations," which is a process that not only intensified the university's commitment but also encouraged open dialogue, ensuring that all stakeholders' voices are heard and integrated into future decision-making.

Amidst these challenges, the university recognized the importance of strategic outreach and collaboration. Wide-ranging efforts, often unseen, were vital in building support and collaboration during the university's transition. "Becoming" involved extensive behind-the-scenes work, including countless individual conversations between Nevada State leadership and other community influencers. While these conversations often went unnoticed, they were essential in building support and furthering understanding of Nevada State's vision. The backing from neighboring institutions like the University of Nevada, Las Vegas and the College of Southern Nevada exemplified a collaborative spirit that benefits the entire Southern Nevada region.

These efforts not only grew community support but also laid the groundwork for impactful initiatives that directly benefit students, such as the No-Cost Textbook program, which is aimed at alleviating financial burdens for learners. Dr. Pollard emphasized, "This initiative reflects our commitment to student success and retention, acknowledging that poverty, not potential, is the primary barrier to college completion." Additionally, recent accreditation achievements in programs like speech-language pathology signal the university's dedication to academic rigor and industry standards.

Alumni Advocacy: Championing a New Identity



A LEAP INTO COLLEGIATE **ATHLETICS**

Women's flag football and men's track and field will soon be the first sports teams at Nevada State

Since the shift from college to university, the strategic initiative that President DeRionne Pollard coined as "Becoming" a university has been a focal point in building Nevada State's future and legacy. Naturally, one question that leadership and the campus community have regarding actualizing the university's mission is: What is next for our story? That next chapter is athletics.



As vice president of student affairs, Dr. Stefanie Coleman is spearheading this monumental project to bring collegiate athletic programs to Nevada State. Since her initial introduction to the

institution in 2019, she has been passionate about elevating the student experience always keeping athletics in mind.

"During my initial interview for my former role as the dean of students, I inquired about the start of an athletics department. At that time, it was viewed as a wishful idea for the future, and it wasn't until Dr.

Pollard was appointed president in late 2021 that a true plan was put into action," said Dr. Coleman.

The unveiling of the official spirit mark in 2021 was one of the first pilot incentives to introduce a form of institutionalized Scorpion Pride to the campus community. This well-received milestone strengthened the already positive excitement among students and proved a want and desire for an athletics program on campus.

Furthering the excitement and promotion of building a school spirit culture, Nevada State University introduced a new mascot, Sting the Fighting Scorpion. And the first Nevada State dance squad, Scorpion Spirit, was founded in 2022.

The 2024-2025 Nevada State Student Alliance executive vice president and Scorpion Spirit dance squad member, Lahana Pearce, has been a vocal key

supporter of bringing a sports program to Nevada State. During the initial athletics presentation to the Board of Regents in June 2024, Pearce expressed her enthusiasm to represent Nevada State in a student-athlete capacity.

"If athletics were brought to Nevada State, it would create a sense of community and school spirit for all Scorpions no matter if they are a graduate or a current student. Additionally, it will help students like me develop important teamwork and leadership skills, needed once [we are] in the Southern Nevada workforce."

Dr. Coleman has advised that expanding student involvement opportunities is essential as the university grows. "Athletics is a chance to offer students a more comprehensive college experience — one that not only aligns with Nevada State's mission but also meets the evolving needs of both the university and its student body.





We looked at potential sports programs that would encourage students to stay in Nevada, keeping our talent and future leaders here to build a stronger Southern Nevada community," Dr. Coleman said.

The research and development centered around athletics has involved collaboration with other institutions in Southern Nevada at the collegiate, club, and high school levels, ensuring that the athletics program complements the regional landscape. This has included conversations with Western Nevada College; Truckee Meadows Community College; the College of Southern Nevada; and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Nevada State's vision extends beyond athletics and provides an opportunity to introduce a new course curriculum. Provost Dr. Sarah Frey and her team are exploring ways to align athletics with Nevada State's current and future academic programs. Although these ideas are still in the beginning stages, athletics pose strong academic value for new majors and specialized programs.

Currently, the university is prioritizing women's flag football and men's track and field as the first official sports teams at Nevada State. "In the valley, women's flag football has evolved into a popular sport, and many athletes are being recruited to play out of state because there is no collegiate flag football team in Nevada," said Dr. Coleman. She also added that a collegiate men's track and field program is absent in Nevada's current higher education landscape.

To pique interest and study participation, the Division of Student Affairs has also hosted several women's flag football clinics for current high school students to learn more firsthand about future athletes' needs.

Nevada State University is preparing students for high-demand careers At Nevada State University, students are at the heart of an educational journey that prepares them for meaningful careers across various fields. The School of Nursing (SON); the School of Education (SOE); and the School of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Business (LASB) all offer degree programs and advanced degree programs designed to meet the workforce's evolving needs for indemand careers.

Shaping the Future of Nursing

Nevada State's SON is leading the way in a constantly developing field and will empower the next generation of nursing leaders through Master of Nursing Leadership degree, which will

launch fall 2025. Dean June Eastridge, Ed.D., highlighted the transformative advantages of obtaining advanced nursing degrees, stating, "An advanced degree helps nurses grow their practice, take on more responsibilities, and work more independently, ultimately enhancing the quality of care they provide to their patients."

Students can personalize their paths to become Advanced Practice Registered Nurses in specialties like nurse practitioners, nurse anesthetists, and nurse midwives, allowing them to align their

career goals with their interests. Dr. Eastridge emphasized that the SON faculty stay closely connected to their fields, noting, "We have faculty who work part time in clinical settings, which helps keep our curriculum fresh and practical," ensuring learning remains relevant and real-world centered.

Looking ahead, Dr. Eastridge anticipates that advanced nursing degrees will continue to evolve in response to technological advancements and global health trends, predicting, "Healthcare providers will need to become more technologically savvy as new tools emerge, to meet the increasingly complex needs of the healthcare landscape."

The focus on global health equips students to provide patient care with empathy and compassion, treating patients as individuals rather than mere diagnoses.

Equipping Students for In-Demand Fields

LASB is Nevada State's largest academic unit, offering diverse programs across six dynamic departments. Each department provides students with a comprehensive education that supports critical thinking, creativity, and social responsibility key skills for success in today's high-demand careers.

A standout benefit for LASB students is learning from faculty dedicated to their success, as Dean Elizabeth Gunn, Ph.D., noted: "Our faculty understand the mission of Nevada State and are here because they genuinely care about students," while the curriculum's focus on real-life

experiences prepares graduates to be academically proficient and socially responsible citizens.

LASB alumni consistently report feeling overprepared for their careers compared to peers from other institutions, attributing this to the hands-on learning and supportive faculty at Nevada State. Dr. Gunn noted that employers increasingly seek candidates with strong liberal arts foundations, even in technical fields. "Employers are looking for independent thinkers who can communicate effectively and work collaboratively, underscoring the importance of these skills in today's in-demand fields," said Gunn.

SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH IN SOUTHERN NEVADA

Nevada State celebrates the grand opening of the Psychoeducational Mental Health Clinic

Nevada State University celebrated the opening of its first mental health clinic on Thursday, Oct. 31, 2024. The Psychoeducational Mental Health Clinic offers health evaluation services for students pre-K through 12th grade or youth ages 3 to 21, helping to fill the need for mental health evaluation services across Southern Nevada. Nevada State faculty and staff and community partners attended the grand opening event. U.S. Senators Catherine Cortez Masto and Jacky Rosen and Congresswoman Susie Lee (NV-03) secured funding for this clinic.

Nevada State University has a history of receiving grant funding to have an impact on mental health. In 2020, Nevada State's School of Education received a subgrant from the Nevada Department of Education to establish career pathways for school-based mental health providers. In 2022, Nevada State School of Education received a five-year, \$1,219,626 federal Mental Health Services Professional Demonstration Grant to fund the Ed.S. school psychology graduate program. And in 2023, Nevada State University received an additional \$1,337,000 funding from

the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to start the Psychoeducational Mental Health Clinic. The purpose of the clinic is to serve as an educational training site for the Ed.S. school of psychology graduate program and as a community resource for families seeking mental health services across Clark County.

Since officially opening its doors on June 24, 2024, the clinic has already begun the intake process for 60 K-12 students and aims to complete 150 evaluations by September 2025. Through the collaborative efforts of the Nevada State school psychology graduate training program and community professionals, the clinic will provide evaluations of mental health needs as well as supportive services to help clients identify and access local educational and therapeutic resources.

"Offering these evaluation services helps address a critical need in Southern Nevada and ensures that students in our community can access the supports and services they need to be successful at home, at school, and in the community," said Nevada State President Dr. DeRionne Pollard. "Having a psychoeducational mental health clinic at Nevada State provides our students with real, clinical experience on campus while providing a much-needed community resource."

"I'm pleased to join Nevada State University leadership, faculty, and staff today to celebrate Nevada State's first mental health clinic, and I want to thank them for all they're doing to provide young Nevadans the support they need," said Cortez Masto. "Mental health is just as important as physical health—that's why I secured federal resources to help this clinic recruit and retain mental health professionals and get our communities quality services. I'll keep fighting to make it as easy as possible for Nevadans to access affordable mental health care."

Lee shared, "I spent two decades working with students to help them succeed in and out of the classroom. I've seen firsthand how providing a holistic approach to their mental health is one of the most important investments we can make in students' success." She continued, "Now that I'm in Congress, I'm continuing that work by bringing back the federal dollars our educators and mental health care providers need. I look forward to seeing [Nevada State] put these funds to good use by caring for their students, families, and the surrounding community."

The clinic offers psychoeducational evaluations to provide recommendations relative to special education eligibility and medically necessary diagnoses, such as attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, autism, developmental disabilities, emotional disorders, intellectual disabilities, and learning disabilities.

SMART GROWTH INITIATIVE KICKS OFF

Nevada State is growing our vibrant, sustainable campus

More than two decades ago, government, business, and community leaders in Nevada came together to develop the bold vision for forming the foundation for today's Nevada State University. The City of Henderson was an early advocate of the university's focus on filling critical workforce needs with affordable and flexible pathways to higher education, and, as such, was granted over 500 acres of land from the federal government to build out the future campus.

Fast-forward to the present, and, today, thanks to these early visionaries and other supportive partners, Nevada State serves more than 7.000 students. However, only 60 acres of the land allotment have been developed. With an ambitious plan to serve 20,000 students by 2047, the time has

arrived for intentional planning to grow the campus in collaboration with the private sector, regional stakeholders, and the surrounding community.

President DeRionne Pollard's recent formation of the Nevada State Campus Lands Corporation (NSCLC) has been a key part of this concerted effort. By convening an NSCLC board of trustees that includes representation from finance, law, development, government, and nonprofit administration, the future growth of Nevada State's campus and its surrounding area will be in alignment with the university's academic mission and Nevada's workforce development goals.

On Oct. 24, the public was invited to learn about the university's goal to build a more



vibrant, sustainable campus through innovative partnerships and thoughtful development. To effectively bridge the gap between higher education and the private sector, NSCLC works to help Nevada State leverage mutually beneficial publicprivate collaborations as well as pioneer advancements in procurement, design, and financing to fully realize its vision. Members of the NSCLC board were part of the kickoff event's panel discussion, where they shared what they hope the power of collaboration will accomplish.

"We're excited to partner with our community," said Dr. Pollard. "It's only natural that we would continue our treasured partnerships with local citizens, entities, and businesses and consider their ideas for the best ways to grow our campus. The future of Nevada State is great, and we want our neighbors to be involved."

Keep your eyes open for more opportunities to participate as conversations and efforts for the work of NSCLC continues. It's important to include the community when advancing Nevada State's bold vision for an affordable institution providing a wide range of educational pathways for traditional and nontraditional students. Young Alumni Award Winners Estefania Sanchez Vega '18 and Efren Vega '17 found both a school and each other at Nevada State. An undocumented student, Estefania had planned to return to her home country of Mexico when she learned of Nevada State. She was amazed when she was welcomed as a full-ride scholarship student! She met Efren in a class, and

the rest is history! Today, Estefania works in immigration at a law firm and uses what she learned to take care of her clients. Her degree gave her confidence and opened doors for her life and career.

Efren had already been dismissed from another institution, but upon hearing about Nevada State, he hoped for one more

chance. "It was like an angel answered me." He learned that he could get back on his feet at Nevada State, and stepping onto campus made Efren feel like he had gained another family. "People said good morning; the events were very welcoming; and it felt like home." Because of what he learned at Nevada State, he tries to be a role model for other people and credits Nevada State with making him a better person, husband, and father. "I want to tell my kids that Mom and Dad are scorpions, and I want them to be scorpions, too!"



Next up was recognition of 2024 Nevada State Alumnus of the Year Brian Hansen '12. The epitome of a nontraditional student, Brian already had a college degree and

a career when he went back to school to change careers. He now serves the community as a registered nurse anesthetist.

For Hansen, the accelerated program was the perfect solution — he had already met many of the prerequisites and could jump right in! He was pleased that the program would allow him to reenter the workforce quickly, and he soon found that the passionate instructors taught and led by example.

His advice to those considering Nevada State? Just do it! "It's a great school with perfect class sizes and where I learned

to work as part of a team, skills I put to use today. I feel blessed to be able to play a part in a health care team that is able to potentially restore patients back to full health. I'm honored by the fact that they put their care and trust in me, and, because of that, I am always striving to further my education. Being acknowledged with this award is humbling and amazing, just like my career."

Another highlight of the evening was the recognition of the new inductees into the Gibson Society, a giving society at Nevada State University for the school's most generous donors who have provided \$750,000 or more to the institution. As the first giving society that the university has established, its mission is to promote the university's growth and improvement. The Nevada State Foundation oversees the Gibson Society and receives/administers private gifts to the institution, the faculty, and students in a variety of ways, including scholarships, construction projects, and daily operations.



The 2024 inductees include **John** and Joy Gombeda, who established The

Gombeda Family Nursing Endowed Scholarship funds. These two nurses have lived a life of service caring for others, and Joy has even served as a clinical instructor at Nevada State's School of Nursing, helping students prepare for their careers.



The NV Energy Foundation was also inducted into the Gibson Society. Its relationship with Nevada State began in 2012 with a \$500,000 gift of support for the capital campaign

and has continued to grow through the years. NV Energy supports the university's expanding community outreach through workforce development and learning opportunities for students.

THE TRANSFORMATIVE POWER OF EDUCATION

Equipping individuals with education, training, and skills

Nevada State University believes in the transformative power of education and prides itself on being an accessible educational resource in Southern Nevada. The phrase coined by President Dr. DeRionne Pollard, "Workforce development is economic development," emphasizes Nevada State's dedication to develop, educate, and empower Southern Nevada's workforce in benefit of our entire community.

The workforce development program at Nevada State University is a comprehensive learning experience designed to provide education, training, and skills development to members of the Southern Nevada community. Its range of programs includes leadership development through the Nevada State Leadership Academy (NSLA), the Scorpion STEAM Academy (SSA) for middle-school students, and the Nevada State Cybersecurity program.

Tom Nicholas, director of workforce development, has seen firsthand how our programs provide participants with a well-rounded approach to advance in the workplace. He believes the effectiveness of each program highlights Nevada State's commitment to serve and educate the community by providing multiple educational avenues to learn and grow.

"The workforce development program is more than another education course; it is a holistic approach to career development. Our role is to provide students with the tools they need to succeed in today's dynamic job market, both during and after they complete the program."

Nevada State Leadership Academy: Supervisor Bootcamp and the Leadership Academy

NSLA is composed of two micro-credential programs: The Supervisor Bootcamp and the Leadership Academy. Both programs utilize an employer-driven model of curriculum development and allow participants to add several specialty leadership areas to tailor the experience to their needs and interests, especially for those without higher education degrees. According to the US Census, only 26.1% of Nevada's population ages 25 and older have earned a bachelor's degree or higher.

For many seeking to advance their skill set, different obstacles can contribute for those unable to commit the time to earning an advanced degree. Nicholas highlighted the importance of continuous learning for career advancement and sees his program as an alternative for those seeking to advance. "Not everyone can commit to several years of traditional education, but by participating in these workforce development programs, individuals can build their current skills and make themselves a more competitive candidate for advancing in their company." This fall, the program will welcome its third student cohort, and enrollment is ongoing for individual courses.

Scorpion STEAM Academy: A Summer Exploration

Scorpion STEAM Academy is not another summer camp; it is an immersive experience that takes place on Nevada State's campus. Students explore the world of science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM) in a university setting with hands-on activities that expose students to different career opportunities in STEAM. During the SSA's week-long programs, students interact with leading industry professionals in STEAM fields, who bring their knowledge and career experience to different in-class projects

and lessons. The summer of 2023 marked the start of the first summer program and has since served over 600 student participants.

Nevada State Cybersecurity

Cybersecurity professionals are needed in today's ever-evolving tech world. Nevada State's multi-course, stackable certification program prioritizes hands-on skills and real-world learning, preparing students for career success. The program has been administered at no cost to eligible participants thanks to a partnership with Nevada Partners and the Supporting and Advancing Nevada's Dislocated Individuals grant from the Governor's Office of Economic Development between 2023-2025; tuition has been fully covered for at least 20 participants to date. "Our industry partnerships and grants provide valuable insights, resources, and connections that enhance the quality of our programs and increase the likelihood of job placement for graduates," Nicholas said.

Dr. Pollard believes that Nevada State has redefined what it means to be part of the higher education space. "Our investment in our community through this work is part of our continued effort to promote economic mobility for the diverse Southern Nevada community. Designed with our students in mind, this program hopes to empower community members in knowing that it is never too late to continue learning." Nevada State University's workforce development programs are more than educational experiences; they open doors to new opportunities for people seeking to advance in their respective careers. "By participating in our programs, you're not only gaining knowledge; you're investing in your future and the future of our community," Nicholas said.

A DECADE EMBRACING THE ARTS

In addition to hosting exhibitions, events, and performances, Nevada State's Office for the Arts is working on an arts assignment repository

This year commemorates the 10th anniversary for Nevada State's Office for the Arts! Headed by Senior Advisor and Executive Director for the Arts Angela Brommel, the office hosts universitywide events, performances, and programs as well as houses the Marydean Martin Writers' Project, the Thalia Dondero Gallery, The Artist at Work series, and the NS Collections & Galleries. In celebration of this milestone, the office is surveying faculty to learn how they have incorporated the NS Collections & Galleries into their student assignments. When complete, this information will reside as an arts assignment repository open to all faculty.

The office's first year focused on building arts partnerships, setting up galleries, and curating the NS Collections & Galleries, which includes the permanent art collection and the Scorpion Authors. The next year, during the opening celebration for the James and Beverly Rogers Student Center and what is now known as the Bob and Alison Kasner Academic Building, new galleries were unveiled as well as The Campus as Museum, a vision that sought to provide greater access to the permanent collections for our students and the community by placing artwork on each floor of every building. Since then, the galleries have hosted over 40 exhibitions, and the collections now include 126 permanent works of art and six outdoor public art murals.

Another notable first event that week was a reading by Juan Felipe Herrera, the 21st poet laureate of the United States. The office has presented and cohosted literary events on campus, online, and in the community. In addition, each April during National Poetry Month, the Marydean Martin Writers' Project cohosts with the City of Henderson Poets on the Plaza, an annual event on Water Street.

The office also presents musical performances and provides two available pianos: one in the Rogers Student Center and the other in the Kasner Academic Building. This spring, co-hosted with the Department of Data, Media, and Design, the Shapiro Project will feature the music of jazz guitarist Wes Montgomery. The Shapiro Project consists of musicians Brian Triola, Boris Shapiro, Marc Solis, and Eugene Shapiro, who serves as part-time music faculty within the Department of Data, Media & Design within the School of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Business.

HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Nevada State's First and Fierce program fosters a sense of belonging for first-generation students

A university campus can feel like a foreign land to first-generation college students, but at Nevada State, they feel right at home. This sense of belonging is largely due to the university's First & Fierce program, which not only makes college possible for some first-gen students but also creates an environment for them to take pride in who they are and where they've come from while supporting them in every step of getting to where they are going.

Launched in Fall 2023, this initiative is not only a response to the increasing number of first-gen students—currently comprising nearly 60% of the university's population—but a heartfelt commitment to those students' unique journeys through higher education.

First & Fierce continually assesses its effectiveness by analyzing completion rates, engagement metrics, and feedback from students. Early indications suggest that first-gen students are thriving, with performances on par with their continuing-generation peers. This success speaks volumes about the impact of a supportive campus community.

What Inspired First & Fierce?

The program's initiation can be traced back to President DeRionne Pollard, a first-generation graduate herself. She recognized a significant gap in support for these students, who often navigate the complexities of university life without the familial wisdom to guide them. Inspired by "the new majority," Dr. Pollard emphasized the need for tailored resources and support specifically for first-gen students, leading to the inception of First & Fierce.

At Nevada State, the term "firstgeneration" encompasses a broad range of students. It includes those whose parents or guardians did not attend college as well as those whose parents completed some college coursework but did not earn a bachelor's degree or whose parents received their education outside of the United States.

At the core of First & Fierce are six foundational pillars: outreach, access, support, placemaking, enrichment, and actualization. Each pillar is designed to enhance the student experience, from initial interest in college through graduation and beyond. The program aims not just to enroll first-gen students but to ensure they thrive, offering everything from scholarship opportunities to academic support and a sense of belonging on campus.

Building Community and Scholarship

The past year has seen a focus on community-building through social events and outreach activities. These gatherings have drawn over 100 students at a time, showcasing a palpable eagerness to connect and engage. The introduction of the First & Fierce scholarship has further provided essential financial support, easing the burden on first-gen students who often face greater financial challenges.

The scholarship provides critical financial assistance, offering \$1,000 for both the fall and spring semesters. This financial boost not only helps cover tuition but also eases the burden of associated costs. allowing students to focus more on their studies and personal development. The First & Fierce Scholarship aims to enhance first-gen students' academic journey, ensuring they have the resources and support needed to succeed at Nevada State. In its first semester, 83 First & Fierce scholarships have been awarded, and more will be distributed during the upcoming Spring semester.

Intersectionality of First-Gen Students' Identities

Inclusivity is a cornerstone of First & Fierce. The program acknowledges the intersectionality of first-gen students' identities, aiming to create events that celebrate their diverse backgrounds. Collaborations with various campus

organizations — such as the Office of Community, Equity, Diversity, & Inclusion - enhance this commitment, ensuring that every student feels seen and valued.

A Vision for the Future

Baily Brown, associate director of First Generation Enrichment and Student Transition, sees a bright future for First & Fierce. As the program progresses, Nevada State is working on establishing peer mentorship programs to help students navigate their college experiences. Plans for more structured initiatives — including career readiness workshops, coaching seminars, and alumni engagement — are in the pipeline.

Looking ahead, the aspirations for First & Fierce are ambitious. Plans include establishing a dedicated physical space for first-gen students, further engagement with alumni, and the introduction of formal recognition at graduation. The long-term vision is to create a robust network that not only assists students academically but also supports leadership and community among them.

FUTURE VISION OF NEVADA STATE

Dr. Sarah Frey is using her position as provost and vice president of academic affairs to meet student needs



For Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Sarah Frey, her journey to Nevada State University from the relatively young University of California (UC),

Merced, which was only 17 years old at the time, has shaped her unique perspective and vision for the distinctive opportunities that emerging universities offer in higher education. As a leader, she aims to empower students by providing them with a platform and a voice while helping Nevada State address students' current needs by offering comprehensive tools and resources to support them throughout their academic journeys.

Dr. Frey's activism for student access to education started early in her career. While a mathematics graduate student at University of Arizona, she began designing a special high school curriculum dedicated to helping Native American students of the Tohono Oodham tribe. Her understanding of diversification in the academic landscape and serving traditionally underrepresented populations was one of the key factors that attracted her to Nevada State University.

During her time as vice provost and dean of undergraduate education at UC, Irvine, she developed courses in collaboration with AMC's "The Walking Dead" to create an educational experience around Season 4 of the award-winning show. The program peaked massive student interest, and over 80,000 students enrolled in these special classes during the partnership's offering.

At Nevada State, Dr. Frey looks forward to creating optimal educational experiences for students both inside and outside the classroom. Fulfilling that promise, the Provost's Student Advisory Board has launched and includes 17 students. The collaboration was intentionally created to ensure the academic offerings at Nevada State align with the aspirations and needs of its students and the Southern Nevada community.

One of her biggest priorities continues to be advancing strategic enrollment management and mapping out what Nevada State wants to be as a campus, finding different majors the school can offer, and implementing innovative ways that the university can better serve its student population. For example, the Office of Academic Affairs is in the early stages of expanding educational opportunities within allied health spectrums to support various health needs of the community that will potentially align with future athletics programs for students. Dr. Frey encourages students, alumni, and faculty to reach out and share their needs and hopes for Nevada State's future.

A SPOTLIGHT ON GLORIA WALKER

Dr. Walker is streamlining operations and helping expand Nevada State's campus



With over 30 years of financial experience in higher education, Dr. Gloria Walker, vice president of finance and business operations, has built an

extensive professional career centered around building a strong financial foundation for colleges and universities. She has solidified her reputation as a trusted leader in higher education finance and as a driving force behind the fiscal success of numerous academic institutions.

Prior to Nevada State, she served as vice president of finance and administration and chief financial officers at the University of New Orleans, providing leadership and oversight to the daily fiscal operations of the college.

Dr. Walker was first introduced to the business side of higher education early in her career at Midland College in the mid-1980s when her husband was appointed as the school's collegiate basketball coach. As her career advanced, Dr. Walker held roles in accounting, finance, business services, and senior/executive leadership at schools including Houston Community College, South Florida Community College,

Cowley College, Texas Southern University, and Florida A&M University. She focused on resolving accreditation and financial stability issues, particularly at minorityserving institutions and historically Black colleges and universities.

She is immensely proud of her collaborative work at Houston Community College and Texas Southern, where she crafted strategic enrollment and management plans for both schools to grow their student populations and implement programs that expanded wrap-around services for traditionally underserved students. These efforts allowed the institutions to focus on increasing accessibility to support services all without directly increasing student fees.

Looking toward the future, Dr. Walker's vision for Nevada State's financial and business operations is to constantly improve and make processes more seamless and efficient for other departments. As Nevada State continues to grow its campus infrastructure, Dr. Walker is striving to find creative and innovative ways to build out the physical landscape of campus.

Dr. Walker's educational background includes a Bachelor of Business Administration with Accounting, a Master of Business Administration with a concentration in finance, and a Doctor of Education in higher ed administration. She holds an active license as a Certified Public Accountant.

SETTING STUDENTS UP FOR SUCCESS

New Dean of the School of Education Dr. Bernnell Peltier-Glaze is developing new programs and resources to assist students



In mid-2024, Nevada State announced a new dean of the School of Education: Dr. Bernnell Peltier-Glaze. Her background in education expands across a

Taking actionable steps toward this goal, in her role as dean, she has established a fundraising committee to add additional financial support for students to use for licensure exams, tuition support, professional development opportunities, and more.

As she continues to promote the already incredible work of Nevada State's education program, she hopes to create workshops for current students and alumni to ensure they feel more confident and prepared about entering the workforce. These workshops will not only serve as a resource but also as a supportive community within the School of Education, taking a comprehensive approach to both academic and nonacademic student life.
